

Statement on Compliance with Modern Slavery Act 2015

UHI Moray, in recognition of its responsibilities under the [Modern Slavery Act 2015](#), adopts a robust approach to eliminating slavery and human trafficking across all of its activities.

Commitment to Responsible Procurement UHI Moray is committed to carrying out procurement of goods and services in an environmentally, socially, ethically, and economically responsible manner. The college seeks to enter into agreements and contracts only with suppliers that share and adhere to this commitment.

Supply Chain Code of Conduct Much of the college's procurement of goods and services is conducted through APUC (Advanced Procurement for Universities and Colleges) Ltd, of which it is a member. APUC requires all suppliers to sign a Supply Chain Code of Conduct, which confirms that the supplier:

- Does not use forced, involuntary, or underage labour.
- Provides suitable working conditions and terms.
- Treats all employees fairly and ethically.

The college utilises this same Supply Chain Code of Conduct for suppliers sourced directly and requires them to confirm compliance as part of the procurement process.

Organisational Structure The college is a partner in the University of the Highlands and Islands (UHI), an integrated tertiary university operating through a partnership of colleges and research institutions. Our collective supply chains include estates and facilities services, ICT and audiovisual equipment, laboratory goods, learning and teaching materials, utilities, and professional services.

Due Diligence and Risk Management In alignment with UHI partnership standards, we apply proportionate due diligence measures, with a particular focus on high-risk areas such as ICT hardware, estates services, and internationally sourced goods. We are committed to identifying and mitigating risks through category reviews and ongoing supplier engagement.
